



While the primary purpose of the event is to provide a fun and educational night for park visitors of all ages, the **Harvest Moon Festival** has become a very important fundraising event for the **Friends**. Proceeds of past festivals have been used by the **Friends** to provide funds for capital improvement projects at Capital Springs - including the design and installation of updated interpretive trail signs and the purchase of video



equipment for the Lussier Family Heritage Center that allows educational and informative programming to be readily available to park visitors. A portion of the proceeds from the 2008 event will be used to design and install native plant gardens surrounding the Lussier Family Heritage Center, with the balance being preserved for several exciting capital improvement projects and partnerships that we look forward to announcing in the near future.

In addition to the goal of the **Friends** to provide financial assistance to the State and County for capital improvements to the park, we also plan to continue to work to initiate periodic conservation-themed educational programming at the park. Spring Is In The Air!

Signs of spring are abundant around Capital Springs State Recreation Area! Several residents of the park are waking up

from their deep winter slumber and others are migrating back, including Sandhill Cranes, Canadian Geese, Red-winged Blackbirds, American Robins and Wood Ducks. We also welcome back park visitors as the weather begins to warm. The Madison Metropolitan Sewerage District boardwalk and lagoons are already seeing a large number of bird watchers as birds return to the area.



The **campground is set to open on April 14th,** just in time for the "Mid-west Horse Show". The new online Dane County Campground Reservation System debuted last year and works nicely. In case you didn't know, **you can also reserve shelters all over the county with the site**, including sites at Capital Springs. Need a dog or trail pass too? It can all be done online! Take a peek at www.reservedane.com.

Trail Construction Progress

The Baxter Park spur trail off of the Capital City State Trail is

progressing nicely. Located off of Clayton Drive connecting to Baxter Park in Madison, the trail consists of limestone screening and boardwalks. Once completed, the Baxter Park spur trail will open a number of recreational opportunities—including linked bike trails—to connected neighborhoods. Staff recently installed a elevated boardwalk on the east side of the Nine Springs Creek



this winter. Now, preparations are in the works to make the final connection to Baxter Park when the ground dries.

If you bike the Capital City State Trail, keep an eye out for workers on the trail this spring. Staff will be working on removing invasive species and a contractor will be crack sealing as well. This will involve having some vehicles and equipment along the trail. Please slow down and use caution so we can keep the trail as safe as possible during this time. Thank you!

The bridge that will take the Capital City State Trail over Fish Hatchery Road is also moving forward. Its completion date has been pushed back from the fall of 2008 to this summer or late fall.

Trail Pass Information

Need a trail pass for the state trails? At the National Trails Day Event on June 6th, you can purchase a trail pass from the Friends - and a portion of the proceeds will go to support the Friends! If you cannot make Trails Day, please take advantage of the state trails self-registration station along the Capital City State Trail or stop in at the Lussier Family Heritage Center during normal working hours.

Volunteering At Capital Springs

We have quite a number of volunteer activities scheduled this spring at the park. As a way to involve more people in our community with the park, we welcome school and church groups who will assist in plantings, wood chipping, and prairie seeding. Below is a list of scheduled activities. Please

- → May 3 The Blackhawk Church will be working on the Indian Springs wood chipping.
- → May 27 Shabazz School will be working at Lake Farm on invasive species removal.
- → June 6 National Trails Days. We will have a rest stop on the Capital City State Trail and a work day removing brush along the side of the trail with Fonatana Sports.

Nature Notes

Leap into Spring with Wisconsin's Frogs!

After a cold and quiet winter, nothing is a more welcome harbinger of spring than the merry call of frogs and toads. Wisconsin is home to many different kinds and sizes, from the tiny spring peeper to the big bullfrog.

Frogs and toads are members of the zoological class amphibians. They may remind you a bit of their reptile cousins (snakes and turtles), but amphibians don't have scales, and they are typically born in the water. They have smooth, moist skin that absorbs moisture and oxygen.

Frogs and toads have distinct calls, and are most vocal during their breeding seasons (early spring through summer). Take a walk around the Capital Spring Recreation Area,

> and vou will hear some of Dane County's most famous amphibians.



Chorus Frog

Chorus Frogs are one of the earliest frogs you will hear in the area. They are tiny (3/4"-1.5"), grayish green frogs that call with a long 'creeaakkk'. It sounds a bit like when you run your finger along a comb.



The American Toad is another amphibian you can hear at the park. Toads have tougher, drier skin that allows them to venture further from water than their frog cousins. Many people hear the toad's song, and have no idea that the musical creature they are listening to is a

small bumpy amphibian! The toad has a variable trill or whistle, which can last up to 30 seconds.

Amphibians frequent wetlands and are very sensitive to **chemicals**, so their habitat is dwindling due to development and environmental pollution. That's why places like the Capital Spring Recreation Area are so important - they provide safe homes for our amphibian friends.

You can help out by learning more about frogs and toads. The best way is to explore the park and listen and look for these little creatures.

Activities for the Entire Family this Spring and Summer

We have numerous activities and volunteer opportunities scheduled this spring at Capital Springs Recreation Area. Take a look at the list below for events that may interest you. We thank you for volunteering your time!

- Prescribed Burn at Lake Farm Park, Thursday, April 23, at 10 a.m.: Dane County will be performing prescribed burns at Lake Farm Park (4330 Libby Road). Adult volunteers are needed. Equipment and training will be provided. Please bring drinking water, a hat, and wear appropriate clothing (no nylon). Contact Rhea Stangel-Maier at 608-224-3601 or stangelmaier@co.dane.wi.us to sign up and for meeting locations. Remember these prescribed prairie burns need the weather to cooperate! Winds and moisture play a factor so please call 245-6898 (on April 23rd) before you venture out for an updated message on whether the burn will be held. Please also contact Rhea if you would be interested in additional prairie planting and seed collections events to be hosted at the park later this year!
- ◆ Take a Stake in the Lake Days, June 7 June 21st: Volunteers adopt a shoreline, beach, river, or park by picking up litter and raking aquatic debris. Groups and individuals are welcome! CAPITAL SPRINGS STATE RECREATION AREA INFORMATION 3101 Lake Farm Road

3101 Lake Farm Road Madison, WI 53711

The Capital Springs Recreation Area just south of Madison encompasses about **3,000 acres** stretching from Fish Hatchery Road east to Lake Waubesa, including most of the Nine Springs E-way. There are many different areas of the park to explore, including the Lake Farm Park, the Jenni & Kyle Preserve, and Capital City State Trail which meanders through the park, connecting to other area

bike trails and downtown Madison. Stop by the Lussier Family Heritage Center for additional information and a map.



Capital Springs protects more than threequarters of a mile of undeveloped Lake Waubesa shoreline.

Hiking and skiing trails, picnic shelters, a boat launch, free bikes, and the Lake Farm Campground are just some of the activities and amenities available. For camping or picnic shelter reservations, contact Dane County Parks at (608) 246-3896, or reserve campsites online at www.reservedane.com. Park Directions: From Madison or Interstate I-90, take the West Beltline (US Highway 12/18) to the South Towne Drive Exit (exit 264) and go south. Continue for almost one mile and then turn left on Moorland Road, which turns into Lake Farm Road after the road curves. The park is located about 1/4 mile past the curve at 3101 Lake Farm Road. You'll see the Lussier Family Heritage Center and campground on your left.
